### **NOTICE BY THE KING CITY COUNCIL OF ITS INTENT TO ADOPT AN ORDINANCE**


NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on February 22, 2022, at 6:00 p.m., or as soon after as the matter may be heard, the City Council of the City of King intends to adopt an Ordinance, entitled:

#### **AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KING AMENDING TITLE II ADMINISTRATION AND PERSONNEL, CHAPTER 2.04, CITY COUNCIL, OF THE CITY OF KING MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO DISTRICT ELECTIONS WITH RESPECT TO ELECTING CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS, ESTABLISHING NEW DISTRICT BOUNDARIES**

#### **SUMMARY**

The proposed Ordinance establishes the following amendments to Title II, Chapter 2.04, City Council, of the King City Municipal Code relating to the boundaries for district based elections: (1) District 1 loses the area east of North Third Street, south of King Street, east of Beech Street, and south of San Antonio Drive to District 2. It also loses one block west of North Third Street and south of King Street to District 3; (2) District 2 loses the area east of South First Street, south of Pearl Street, west of Jayne Street, and south of the large field between Jayne Street and San Lorenzo Creek to District 5. It also loses three blocks west of South San Lorenzo Avenue to District 5. District 2 gains the aforementioned area from District 1. It also gains four blocks east of North San Lorenzo Avenue and south of Ellis Street from District 3; (3) District 3 loses the aforementioned area to District 2. It gains the aforementioned area from District 1. It also gains the area north of King Street and west of Sandringham Street from District 4; (4) District 4 loses the aforementioned area to District 3. It gains the area west of Canal Street, south of Broadway Street, and north of Highway 101 from District 5; and (5) District 5 loses the aforementioned area to District 4. It gains the two aforementioned areas from District 2. The Ordinance amendments and district map was selected after the City of King hired a professional demographer, who prepared 5 options for consideration, and solicited feedback from the public through four (4) public hearings. At the conclusion of these public hearings, the City Council determined the amendments and map best met all the criteria set forth by State and Federal law and traditional redistricting principles.
